

ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER OF THE  
PRESIDING JUDGE RE: COVID-19  
PANDEMIC

GENERAL ORDER

No. 20-14

Upon application from this court, Chief Justice Tani G. Cantil-Sakauye, Chair of the Judicial Council of California issued her emergency order on March 17, 2020 authorizing the court to limit operations of the Tulare County Superior Court in response to the COVID-19 crisis under Government Code 68115. Pursuant to orders dated April 13, 2020, May 11, 2020, June 8, 2020, July 8, 2020, August 10, 2020, and September 17, 2020 the Chief Justice extended certain emergency orders through November 20, 2020. The court issued its General Order 20-13 on September 17, 2020 to implement emergency orders granted through November 20, 2020.

The COVID19 epidemic and federal, state, and local declarations of a public health emergency continue to adversely impact the court’s ability to conduct operations while protecting the

1 safety of court users as directed through limiting personal contacts and maintaining personal  
2 distancing. On November 18, 2020, the court made application to the Judicial Council to provide relief  
3 related to deadlines for criminal jury trials. On November 19, 2020, the Chief Justice and Chair of the  
4 Judicial Council issued her emergency order authorizing this court to implement emergency relief for  
5 the period from November 21, 2020 through January 22, 2021 pursuant to Government Code 68115.  
6 A copy of the November 19, 2020 emergency order is attached.

7  
8 Since the initial emergency orders were granted, the court has implemented extensive  
9 procedures and processes to enable the court to increase services provided by the court while  
10 protecting public safety by designing and implementing a comprehensive social distancing and public  
11 health plan in all court facilities. At this time all departments of the court are conducting the court's  
12 business. Local and state emergency orders remain in effect and the court will continue to operate so  
13 that those with essential business at court facilities can come to the court safely and in accordance with  
14 guidance issued by public health officials. The court has made its clerks' offices available by  
15 appointment, has made telephone access to clerks' offices available, and has provided a number of  
16 means (other than by in person visit to the court) by which parties and the public can file documents  
17 with the court. The court has implemented audio streaming of court proceedings. In order to comply  
18 with public health directives, the court is committed to gradually increasing the number of persons  
19 who can safely enter all courthouse facilities.

21 Although the federal Constitution generally precludes closure of substantive courtroom  
22 proceedings in criminal cases and California's Code of Civil Procedure section 124 generally  
23 precludes closure of substantive courtroom proceedings in civil proceedings, the current COVID-19  
24 crisis resulting in federal, state, and local public health orders and advisories clearly demonstrates an  
25 overriding interest in temporarily limiting courthouse entry and permitting access to only those  
26 persons who have essential business or are required to appear in person in any Tulare County  
27 courthouse. Public health and safety would be threatened absent such a temporary restriction, which is

1 narrowly tailored to permit only those required to enter the County's courthouses; there is no less  
2 restrictive means of achieving this overriding interest. (*NBC Subsidiary (KNBC-TV), Inc. v. Superior*  
3 *Court* (1999) 20 Cal.4<sup>th</sup> 1178, 1181-1182.)

4 IT IS ORDERED:

5 For any court proceedings occurring while this order is in effect, any judge of the court may  
6 permit press coverage of proceedings in accordance with California Rules of Court 1.150.

7  
8 Access to any and all courthouse facilities is restricted to persons with an appointment and to  
9 those persons either required to appear in person for a court hearing or have essential business within  
10 the courthouse. Persons required to appear generally include parties, their attorneys, victims, jurors,  
11 and witnesses subpoenaed to testify. Any judge of the court may approve additional access to  
12 courtroom proceedings for good cause shown. Members of the public can access audio streaming of  
13 court proceedings by accessing the court's web site.

14  
15 In accordance with the Judicial Council's Statewide Emergency Order dated March 30, 2020,  
16 any judge of the court may suspend any rule in the California Rules of Court to the extent such rule  
17 would prevent a court from using technology to conduct judicial proceedings and court operations  
18 remotely, in order to protect the health and safety of the public, court personnel, judicial officers,  
19 litigants, and witnesses.

20  
21 Any judge of the court may extend the time period provided in section 1382 of the Penal Code  
22 for the holding of a criminal trial by not more than an additional 30 days. This applies to cases in  
23 which the original statutory deadline otherwise would expire from November 21, 2020 through  
24 January 22, 2021 and to any case for which a previously extended deadline would expire from  
25 November 21, 2020 through January 22, 2021.

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1 THIS ORDER IS EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY. IT WILL REMAIN IN EFFECT THROUGH  
2 JANUARY 22, 2021. THIS ORDER MAY BE AMENDED AS CIRCUMSTANCES REQUIRE.


## THE JUDICIAL COUNCIL OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, leading to health and safety concerns resulting in substantial operational impediments, and the proclamations of states of emergency by federal, state, and local officials, it was determined on March 17, April 13, May 11, June 9, July 8, August 10, and September 17, 2020, that the conditions described in Government Code section 68115 were met with regard to the Superior Court of California, County of Tulare (Court). Based on those determinations, and pursuant to the Court's requests, seven prior emergency orders issued, authorizing the Court to implement certain relief under Government Code section 68115. Upon the renewed request of Presiding Judge Brett R. Alldredge, it is determined that the conditions described in Government Code section 68115(a) continue to exist (Gov. Code, § 68115(c)), and it is ordered that the Court is authorized to do the following:

- Hold sessions anywhere in the county, including in correctional and juvenile detention facilities, from November 21, 2020, to January 22, 2021, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(1)); and
- Extend the time period provided in section 1382 of the Penal Code (section 1382) for the holding of a criminal trial by not more than 30 days, applicable only to cases in which the original or previously extended statutory deadline otherwise would expire from

November 21, 2020, to January 22, 2021, inclusive (Gov. Code, § 68115(a)(10); Executive Order N-38-20 (03-27-20)).\*

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\* This authority supplements the authority to extend section 1382 deadlines previously granted in the March 23, March 30, and April 29, 2020 statewide emergency orders and in the June 9, July 8, August 10, and September 17, 2020, emergency orders specific to the Court. Accordingly, for any case in which the time to bring a defendant to trial previously was extended under one or more of those prior emergency orders, and the extended deadline falls within the above-specified time period, this order authorizes the Court to extend the previously extended deadline by up to an additional 30 days. For any case in which the initial section 1382 deadline falls within the above-specified time period and is not governed by a prior emergency order, this order authorizes the Court to extend the time to bring a defendant to trial by a total of up to 30 days.
